

Pupil Premium Statement 2019/20

The Pupil Premium was initially an amount of money that schools received for each pupil who was eligible for Free School Meals (FSM). This changed in April 2012 to include any children who had been in receipt of FSM any time in the past 6 years (Ever 6 Pupils)

Pupil Premium is also received for those children whose parents are in the Armed Forces, adopted from care, looked after by the Local Authority or those who are subject to a special Guardianship order.

National statistics show that children who are in receipt of FSM do less well than their peers.

As a school with fewer students who are in receipt of FSM compared with all schools nationally we do not ring fence our funds for individual pupils but aim to provide targeted support where necessary to diminish any differences in attainment between our groups of children, recognising that not all vulnerable children are in receipt of this additional funding.

We aim to ensure that teaching and learning opportunities address the needs of all pupils, offering challenge and resources to support all groups.

We have identified some common barriers to learning and sought methods to overcome them using Pupil Premium funds.

- Weak literacy/numeracy skills
- Speech and language
- Social and emotional barriers
- Low self esteem
- Language comprehension
- Lack of resources at home to support learning
